History of Harbottle Show

The first Show took place in 1854 – over 150 years ago because there have been cancellations because of wars, floods, pandemics, foot and mouth disease, Princess Diana's funeral and lack of funds (in 1931 in the Great Depression). Early shows are mostly referred to as Harbottle Flower Show, and took place close to the current site, near the Presbyterian church, on land belonging to Mr R Blacklock of the Forster's Arms Inn. By 1868 they had relocated to the parkland in front of the inhabited Harbottle Castle, thanks to the Clennells. At the start of the 1970s following the sale of the Castle by the Fenwick-Clennells the Show relocated to the current site, courtesy of John Common Esq.

Harbottle Horticulture and Poultry Society became a registered charity in 1970 with Goff Blakey, Lizzie Robinson, Bill Thomas and Bernard Richardson as trustees. Lizzie Robinson was secretary for many years through the 60s 70s and 80s and Jane Edmondson took over from her and was a long serving secretary until the early 2000s.

At the start the Shows had flower, fruit and vegetable classes, and poultry. The Industrial section was added in the 1930s. Dogs have always featured in various forms, dog shows, sheepdog trials, hound trails, and terrier races. The poultry was dropped sometime after the second world war because of red tape relating to movement restrictions and biosecurity.

The sports have changed quite a lot over the years, although wrestling has been a continuing feature, along with quoits and flat races. The football kick, slow bicycle race, bicycle race, stepping a chain, tug of war, fell race and pillow fight (later known as bolster and bar) have not lasted. Horses have sometimes featured, but sheep were only introduced in the 1970s.

There have always been children's classes, at one time there were seven schools entering work: Alnham, Netherton, Kidlandlee, Windyhaugh, Holystone and Hepple as well as Harbottle.

Early show-goers listened to the Ashington and Alnwick brass bands. In the 1920s and 30s Northumbrian small pipe competitions were held with a special class for the scouts. At that time, a lot of shepherds played the small pipes. From the 1960s the Rothbury Pipe band has often opened the Show. More recently the music tent was launched in 2014 with Alastair Anderson performing.

In 1938 the Show committee advertised for a caterer for lunches teas and a dance at night promising a good return. But in 1945, when rationing was in force, folk were told to bring their own food. In the 1970s through to the 1990s the Show Ladies ran the tea tent, until hygiene certificates became a requirement and Sylvia Gilbertson took over.

There has never been any alcohol at the Show itself, but until fairly recently the Show was followed by a dance in the evening where there would have been alcohol served (a 'ball' in early reports, a ceilidh through the 1990s and 2000s). For many years they were held in the Village Hall but moved to a ceilidh in the Show tent in the late 1970s and stopped in the early 2000s. Folk clearly had more stamina then - nowadays the team is happy to sit down and enjoy the auction in the pub.

CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME

A very special welcome to one and all for the 150th show. As far as we can ascertain, the first show took place in 1854. However various world wars, foot-and-mouth outbreaks as well as a more recent pandemic have seen a few years without a show taking place. The fact that this show, along with so many other rural shows, has been going for so long bears testament to their importance in the fabric of rural life.

A time traveller from 1854 may be astounded by many modern-day trappings; but would be very familiar with many of the classes in the Industrial tent. They would recognise the game of quoits as well as the sport of Cumberland Wrestling. The breeds at the sheep show may have changed since their day, however it would still be a familiar sight.

This year's show is to be opened by Rothbury Pipe Band and will prove to be a spectacular sight as they parade from the Castle Car Park to the Show Field to officially open the Show. Amongst other attractions, we have a horseshoeing demonstration, again something that would be well known to our 1854 time traveller.

Returning to the Cumberland Wrestling, we are very proud to host the 15 stone World Championships this year. The wrestling is a fantastic spectacle and great credit must go to the Wrestling academy at Rothbury where so much work is done to keep the sport alive.

The Music Tent will entertain you all afternoon and the variety and talent on display shows how strong traditional music is within our locality.

The Dog Show, the Children's Races and the Craft and Trade tent are all here, and if you are in need of refreshment call in at the Tea Tent.

So a big 'thank you' to all in our community who have supported our Show over the years, and here's to the next 150.






